RESEARCH PAPER PRESENTATIONS

The month of March happened to be very special for JDSOLA. After months of working, we finally got to organize and conduct our own college fest, PaperPlanes. very PaperPlanes'21 was definitely something to remember, all the more because it was completely held online. One of the events that I would like to talk about was the Academic conclave. The undergraduate conference was one of its kind, and its objective was to set up a platform where undergraduates could present their wonderful research. The event was wonderful, with students submitting their papers in different disciplines. To top it off, we had our former Dean, Dr. George Jose gave us the inaugural speech.

RESEARCH PAPER 1: THROUGH THE DISCOURSE OF IDENTITY AND INDIGENEITY: AN INQUIRY INTO NICOLA DURVASULA'S WORKS

The presentations started with Speaking about Nicola Durvasula's life, and her works. The paper understood Nicola's perspectives and made a connection between her views on Indian Philosophy and paintings, and the Indian culture. She is said to have made a connection between art and music, being a musician herself. Elements of Tantra have also appeared in her painting, reflecting her interests. Her interests in the cultures and rituals meant she included objects of rituals from daily life. The paper, describing her as a Western artist, explores her interests into the Indian culture, as represented by her art. The paper also talks about color schemes, lines, etc, she uses and the reasons behind the same. Her paintings are said to have been made for the western viewership. The paper finally goes on to take samples of Nicola's work and tries to describe them.

RESEARCH PAPER 2: GENOCIDE AND THE COMPARATIVE SOCIOLOGY OF VIOLENCE

The next paper dealt with the sociology of genocide, taking into consideration the Algerian and the Rwandan Genocide. The study tried to understand the factors that played a role in violence and described the factors that are important to understand the nature psvcho-social and political of genocide. The paper describes both the academic and practical purpose in understanding genocide, or the factors that lead up to a genocide. The paper at first, described at length, the Rwandan Genocide in 1994, and the Algerian Genocide of 1990. It then went on to discuss the emotions of violence, describing the intolerance between communities the in Rwanda. The competition in politics was an important factor in the Algerian Genocide.

From the psychological aspect, the paper talked about the psyche of venting on part of the perpetrators. The mentality of the groups was given importance in the paper. The paper suggests that proper channels of communication could have reduced the intensity of the mass killing. The paper concluded by mentioning the impact genocide can have on the economy, including an economic slump, loss of capital and its high cost, the deteriorating health of the people, and a reduced labor supply.





RESEARCH PAPER 3: EVALUATING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF UGC SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICIES: A REVIEW

Another paper, in the field of psychology was written in the light of sexual harassment in universities. The paper evaluated the effectiveness of sexual harassment policies made by the UGC. The aim was to evaluate the policy principles. measures and implementation of the measures. Sexual harassment experienced by students in universities are said to increase every year, globally. The paper highlights the perception of undergraduate students, where most of them feel that anti-sexual harassment education is useful in preventing sexual harassment in colleges. Sexual harassment in college has been identified as a major impediment to the learning environment and affects the victim's capacity to learn. The Saksham and UGC report, as mentioned by the paper, depict a zero-tolerance measure towards sexual harassment and provide different guidelines and measures to deal with the same. However, there are some drawbacks of these guidelines, including: the assumption that officials do not carry biases, since there are no checks made, the majority of literature on gender sensitization looking at women as the oppressed, etc. The paper suggests that education has the ability to prevent the prevalence of sexual harassment, by changing social norms. The paper makes a recommendation to include content in gender sensitization workshops about violence against the LGBTQ+ community, and other policy changes to make the UGC guidelines more effective.

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RESEARCH PAPER 4: HOW MANY SITAS?

Yet another paper spoke about how the character of Sita varied across the different versions of the Ramayana. As has been



written in the paper, some of the Versions of the Ramayana have also focused more on Sita or Ravana. The paper also notes that with the different versions of Ramayana, Sita's character changes. The paper makes a connection between these versions of Sita and the time period that they belong to. The paper mainly focuses on the versions of Ramayana by Valmiki, Tulsidas, Kampan and Andhra Pradesh's oral tradition. The paper, while describing Valmiki's Ramayana, brings out the 2 versions of Sita in Lanka: one where she defends her husband and one where she wonders if Ram would rescue her. The paper also focuses on the various norms in society and has brought out the patriarchy represented in some of these telling's. Further, the paper focuses on the telling by Kampan, which gives a lot of importance to Sita's purity and chastity, describing what the situation of women might have been in Kampan's times. While the paper spoke of Tuslidas' Sita, it highlighted the difference between Sita and Surpanakha, the latter being described as evil, to represent the ideal versus the non-ideal woman. The oral telling's from Andhra Pradesh were found to be more female centered. The paper gives a good picture of the versions of Ramayana described.

RESEARCH PAPER 5: WHO IS THE MODERN ARTIST?

The last paper tried to highlight individuality in modernity with the radical nature of the Avant Garde. The paper begins by briefly asking if modernity can be defined in an allencompassing way. The paper follows up with the question to answer that modernity is to be looked at with much more detail to understand smaller components, and areas that modernity affected. The paper goes on to mention how modernity and modernization have been used interchangeably.

The paper looked at Avant Garde, and how modernity brings changes to individuals and the areas that constitute it. After making a distinction between science and society, the asked various questions about paper rationality and ethics. The paper also tried to provide a radical understanding of artistic modernity. The paper attempted to understand the smaller agents involved under the term "Avant Garde", noting that the individual is an important part that is shaped and is shaped by modernity. The paper also discussed the increase in consumerist culture in modernity, Avant Garde's response to modernity, and the idea of the modern individual.

The event was very enriching in terms of the participation, the knowledge and the diversity. I believe that it accurately represented the festival's theme of going beyond the boundaries.


